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1. WHAT DOES THIS PASSAGE TEACH ME ABOUT GOD?

Not to over generalize, but in reality, every passage, directly or indirectly, is about God. The Bible is God's revelation to man. In its pages, we have everything God wants us to know. Therefore, don't rush, but spend some thoughtful moments in answering this question.

It's always a good idea, though, to check your conclusions (especially if you are unsure) with a well-respected, solid Bible teacher or commentary. I like to use those found on <u>blueletterbible.com</u>.

2. WHAT DOES THIS PASSAGE TEACH ME ABOUT MAN?

The Bible is the story of God's relationship to man—specifically His rescue plan. It is the story of God reaching out to rescue His creation. In its pages, we see our weakness, our vulnerability, and our value. With an open heart, allow the Lord to reveal truth about you through the mirror of the Bible.



3. WHAT TYPE OF LITERARY GENRE IS THIS PASSAGE?

Is it a narrative, Hebrew poetry, letter or prophecy? Each needs to be interpreted accordingly. You also need to pay attention to any literary devices the author may be using such as figures of speech, hyperbole, or simile. Understanding the intention of the author, or what Bible scholars call "authorial intent", is critical in order to arrive at the correct interpretation

4. ARE THERE ANY DIFFICULT WORDS OR CONCEPTS IN THIS PASSAGE?

As you read, mark any key words or major concepts that you might not completely understand. You'll need to take note of them and look them up in a good Bible dictionary.



5. WHAT IS THE "FALLEN CONDITION FOCUS"? WHY WAS THIS PASSAGE ORIGINALLY WRITTEN?

This is a big question that can really shed a lot of light on any given section of Scripture.

"Fallen Condition Focus" is a term I learned from Bryan Chapell in his Christ-Centered Preaching Course. It describes the reason why a given passage was written.

Everything in the Bible was written to people who were fallen. What "fallen condition" does the passage in question address? Jealousy, idolatry, unforgiveness, love, generosity, etc?

Once you know the fallen condition focus, you are well on your way to discovering God's message to you through the passage.



6. WHAT DO YOU HAVE IN COMMON WITH THE ORIGINAL READERS/HEARERS OF THIS PASSAGE?

This question goes hand in hands with the preceding one. Once we know the fallen condition focus of a passage, we can draw a line to our current culture and condition and begin to apply a passage to our lives.

7. ARE THERE ANY REPEATED WORDS OR PHRASES?

I like to use colored pencils and highlight repeated words and phrases in my paper bible. Here's a suggestion: try printing out a chapter (or several), double-spaced, and then highlight any related words or concepts in different colours. Try this with Psalm 107!



8. WHAT IS THE LARGER CONTEXT OF THIS PASSAGE?

Remember the phrase "Context is king!" You want to ask questions like, "What do the surrounding verses say? What about the theme of the chapter? The book?"

This question is key to staying on track with your Bible study. You are not going to discover some hidden meaning that has never been seen! This question helps you not to go off on bad interpretations that could lead to false teaching.

9. WHAT STANDS OUT TO ME IN THIS PASSAGE? WHAT REALLY IMPRESSED ME?

This is the heart of Bible reading and study. We want to discover what the Holy Spirit is speaking to us. We want to use wisdom. We look at Scripture, but we also look at our own heart. We should never read the Bible only to get information; we should it read it seeking transformation. Always be looking for application.

10. ARE THERE ANY OTHER BIBLE PASSAGES ABOUT THE SAME TOPIC?

After looking at your principal passage, go through three steps to deal with any difficult passages, words, or topics.

First, ask yourself if there are any other Bible passages dealing with the same topic written by the same human author? For example, if you're looking at a word used by Paul in Romans, you should look to see how he uses it in his other letters before you look to see how Peter or John use it.

Second, take a look throughout the same testament (old or new) for parallel passages dealing with the topic you're studying.

Third, look in the other testament to see how the word or concept is being developed or has been used.
